Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Hotchkiss Hotel, constructed in 1896-1897, is located on a corner site at the main commercial intersection of the town of Hotchkiss in west central Colorado. The building is two stories high with a flat roof and is constructed of brick bearing walls with a wood structural system. The design of the exterior has been changed very little since original construction.

The facade is composed of four bays. The hotel occupies both floors of the first two bays nearest the corner and the second floor of the third and fourth bays. There are commercial storefronts on the ground floor of the third and fourth bays. The original storefront in the third bay has been covered by wood siding; however, the fourth bay contains its original wood framing and the entrance has recently been returned to its original recessed position. Above the second floor windows, the signs painted on the brick of the original business occupants are faintly visible through layers of paint.

Bays one and two have two openings at each floor; bays three and four have two and three window openings at the second floor. All of the openings around the building are segmental arched and set deep within the thick walls. The tall, narrow windows are 2 x 2, double hung wooden sash with wood sills. The main hotel entrance, originally a wide double door, has been made smaller by the addition of glass brick at the top and sides.

Across the top of the front wall is a corbelled brick cornice supporting an elaborate parapet consisting of recessed panels bordered top and bottom by diapering. The parapet has recently been repaired and stabilized.

The rear of the building is unornamented and contains openings similar to those on the front and side. There have been several later additions to the rear of the 3rd and 4th bays including a second story deck reached by a wooden stair and a one story shed roof addition. The backyard, fenced with a non-original log fence, has grass with small fruit trees around the perimeter.

On the interior, the first floor of the hotel portion contains the lobby, manager's quarters, and a barber shop, behind which are located the hotel laundry and public showers. On the second floor, the small hotel rooms have had some alterations and the addition of plumbing fixtures, but the original skylights, pressed tin ceilings, and wooden door frames remain intact. The interiors of the commercial spaces have been altered many times as the tenants have changed, but they retain the full ceiling height except for one small shop where the ceiling has been lowered.

One curious feature of the building is the second floor doorway seen on the front facade which leads nowhere. There is no physical evidence that there ever was an outside stair to the door or a balcony and it is presumed to have been a fire exit.

Rehabilitation of the building is gradually progressing with the stabilization of foundation and walls, roofing and new gutters to stop the water erosion of the brick on the south side and rear of the building.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Hotchkiss Hotel has played a significant role in the history of the small western Colorado town of Hotchkiss. It was the first major commercial building constructed in the community, with the town developing around the building. The Hotchkiss Block, as it was originally known, contained both commercial space with ground floor storefronts and a hotel, which was operated continuously since opening in 1897. The building has been an important center for social, business, and cultural activities not only for Hotchkiss, but for other nearby towns. The commercial spaces have been occupied by many of the town's leading businesses. The building is also significant for its association with its original builder and owner, Enos T. Hotchkiss, founder of the town. Constructed of local materials, the exterior of the building is relatively unaltered and its design is representative of the commercial architectural trends of the towns on the Western Slope of Colorado's Rocky Mountains in the 1890s.

Hotchkiss is located on the North Fork of the Gunnison River in an area of fruit growing, coal mining and ranching activities. Formerly Ute Indian territory, the townsite was homesteaded by George Duke in 1882 and later bought by Enos T. Hotchkiss, a Pennsylvanian, who founded the town in 1885. He began construction on the Hotchkiss Block in 1896 and the completion was celebrated with a grand opening ball on February 17, 1897. The exterior of the building is faced with fired bricks made by Al and Carl Hotchkiss, nephews of Enos of clay from the clay pits near the present day fairgrounds.

The hotel accommodated about fifty guests and offered such services as a barber, baths with hot and cold water, transportation to the railroad line and a first class livery stable. There was also a restaurant and a bar in the hotel.

Among the first occupants of the building's commercial space were the U.S. Post Office, Coburn and Sanders Hardware Store and the E.T. Hotchkiss General Mercantile. Throughout the years, other occupants have been grocers, furniture stores and farm implements. There was a sales sample room in the hotel for wholesalers and salesmen to display their wares and it was the central trading place for the surrounding valley towns including Paonia, Somerset, Delta and Crawford.

Today, the Hotchkiss Hotel is a substantial reminder of the faith and optimism held by the town's early settlers for the future prosperity of the town and the surrounding community.


